Each year a keynote speaker and a theme are chosen to help us explore how we can make holy

HISTORY OF SUMMER CONFERENCE

The Summer Conference, originally known as the Mount Angel Summer Conference, was hosted by Mount Angel Abbey for the first 25 years beginning in 1983. In 2007, after 25 years of vision and leadership, the founders of the Conference handed the reigns to long-time Conference participants who formed Engelberg Conference, a non-profit organization, and reinitiated the Summer Conference in its new location at the University of Portland in 2008. The Conference continues to maintain ties to Mount Angel Abbey, and the Benedictine philosophy of integrating work and prayer permeates our activities at Summer Conference.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Conference begins on Wednesday with registration from 2:00-4:30 p.m. and concludes with Mass on Sunday. The days in between are filled with a variety of study, prayer, and play for all ages.

KEYNOTE LECTURE

idan Kavanagh defined Aliturgy as "doing the world the way it was meant to be done." This series of talks will eventually come to a definition of liturgy, but it will begin with a doctrine of creation and see all of life through a Eucharistic lens. What place did God intend for man and woman in the world? What went wrong? How is our life restored? What is the Church doing to discover true reality?

On the first day we will consider creation as a cosmic liturgy, over which man and woman were intended to preside. Our second day will be a look at

sin and the damaged relationship between humanity and God. Day three will invite us to see Christ as the premiere liturgist, restoring to us a eucharistic posture. On our final day we will apply liturgical theology to our life in the world. How do we receive life as a gift, and find the world to be sacrament? How does liturgy establish social justice? How can we see all of life in the light of Mt. Tabor?

Adult Classes

<u>PERIOD A</u> 1. KEYNOTE ADDRESS David Fagerberg

<u>PERIOD B</u> 2. DIALOGUE WITH DAVID FAGERBERG David Fagerberg

An opportunity for additional exploration of the specific topics presented in the keynote talk through discussion in a small group setting.

3. KNOWING SELF, KNOWING GOD *Bill Zuelke*

This class will explore the interrelationship between our own self knowledge and our perceptions and constructs (knowledge) of God. Using reflective exercises and story telling within the classroom, as well as content provided by the instructor, participants will actively explore and articulate their own sense of self and of God and how these elements connect with each other.

4. RUNNING INTO THE ARMS OF GOD: UNDERSTANDING PRAYER AS STORY AND STORY AS PRAYER

Fr. Pat Hannon, C.S.C.

We will explore the experience of prayer as the hearing and telling of stories. Recognizing that Jesus often used story and parable as the primary pedagogical tool for explaining who God is, who we are, and what the Kingdom of God is, we will explore the powerful effect of stories in our spiritual lives and how they draw us more deeply than anything else into the mystery of God.

PERIOD C

5. STORIES FROM THE SYNOD IN THE YEAR OF FAITH

Fr. Jeremy Driscoll, O.S.B.

Fr. Jeremy was one of 45 theologians from every part of the world named by Pope Benedict to assist the 250 bishops from around the world who gathered in Rome last October for a three-week-long meeting called a Synod. This class explains with pictures and personal stories how a Church Synod functions and how this one in particular functioned. This Synod marked the 50th anniversary of the opening of Vatican Council II. Fr. Jeremy will explain some of the principle themes that the bishops spoke about during the Synod and how these themes can inspire our own renewed engagement in the life of faith.

6. THE SPIRITUALITY OF BREAD

Sr. Mary Jo Chaves, OSF

This will be a "hands-on" class in the art of making bread and enjoying the bread we have baked. We will explore the spirituality of bread as a parable for God's work in our lives that enables us to break the bread of our lives for others.

7. THE GOOD NEWS OF BRUCE Andy Oldham

Bruce Springsteen, an iconic American performer and songwriter, has reached the hearts and lives of millions around the world with his music. A lapsed Catholic, Bruce still stands on the stairs of the Church looking in and invites others to do the same. We will explore how his entire body of work is rooted in the gospel message of salvation for all. Each song, each performance again and again proclaims loudly that no matter how dark and messy our lives and our world gets, hope and redemption are real and possible. We will listen, view, talk, and reflect. *Gr. 10 and up.*
