Keynote Speaker and Conference Theme

Ir. Ray Kemp, will guide us to an understanding and experience of being formed and transformed into a church that opens itself to conversion, reconciliation and justice. We will look at how we have received the Gospel, our call to conversion and reconciliation, and the experience of God's transforming love that pulls us to a life of serving others.

He will explore this year's theme, Living the Just Word, in four keynote presentations:

- 2. Conversion Church that is the Heart of Disciples
 Becoming Apostles
- 3. The Ministry of Reconciliation Within and Without
- 4. Building a Church for the Mission of Serving the Kingdom

He comes to Summer Conference with enthusiasm and excitement to help us develop a new appreciation for one another and the community we are building through sharing and listening. He comes to help cultivate a sense of common ground and to be church with and for each other.

Fr. Ray Kemp has a lifelong passion for social justice with a deep interest in pastoral theology, liturgy, preaching, Christian initiation, community organizing, urban develop-

He teaches theology at Georgetown University and is director of both Faith in the City and Preaching the Just Word –a national program sponsored by Woodstock Theological Center to assist ministers of the gospel in preaching biblical and social justice more effectively.

WHAT IS SUMMER CONFERENCE?

For over 28 years the Summer Conference has provided participants with time for reflection and renewal.

The annual Conference themes explore the challenges of living our faith. How do we make holy our chosen roles as parents, teachers, business owners or employees and create a bit more of the Kingdom of God here in our time? We believe that when we explore ways to live out the Gospel in our families and communities, we are building the Church.

That Benedictine philosophy of integrating work and prayer, that comes from our roots at Mount Angel Abbey, continues to permeate the activities of the Summer Conference.

THE GOALS OF SUMMER CONFERENCE

- To provide clergy, religious and lay people of all ages an opportunity to deepen their faith through study, prayer, art and play in a communal setting.
- To expose participants to outstanding theologians and inspiring people of faith.
- To model a Catholic faith-based community to each other and to our children.
- To seek to understand more honestly the mystery of God and the mystery of person within the community of Catholic faith.

HISTORY

The Summer Conference I originally known as the Mount Angel Summer Conference, was hosted by Mount Angel Abbey for the first 25 years beginning in 1983. A change in Conference venue and sponsorship was needed in 2007, the 25th year of the Conference. In 2008 long-time conference participants formed Engelberg Conference a nonprofit organization and re-initiated Conference in its new location at the University of Portland. The Conference continues to maintain strong ties to Mount Angel Abbey.

GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT THE WEEK

The conference begins on Wednesday afternoon with registration from 2:00-4:30 p.m. The following days include study, prayer, and play for both children and adults. Afternoon recreation opportunities include swimming, games, walks, reading, conversation, or even a nap. Evening options include adult social time, a movie night for kids, fine arts, music, or games on the lawn. We conclude our time together with Mass on Sunday.

Residence facilities are available with three meals a day. Day-use facilities are available for commuters -with or without meals.
