

Dr. Cecilia González-Andrieu is professor of Theology at Loyola Marymount University, where she also works on multiple initiatives to serve the Latinx community, especially undocumented students. A graduate of LMU and the Graduate Theological Union Berkeley, she is a contributing writer for America Magazine and publishes and speaks widely as a public theologian. Committed to a faith that does justice, she is also a member

of the board of directors of the Ignatian Solidarity Network and an advisor to the Discerning Deacons Project. A respected international lecturer on issues of political theology, theological aesthetics, and Latino theology she is the author of the book Bridge to Wonder: Art as a Gospel of Beauty, co-editor of Teaching Global Theologies: Power and Praxis, and a contributor to many other publications, including Go Into the Streets: The Welcoming Church of Pope Francis, Contemporary Art & Religion: A Curious Regard, and the forthcoming second volume of Catholic Women Preach.

#### WHAT IS SUMMER CONFERENCE?

Since 1983, the Summer Conference has provided participants with time for reflection and renewal. We come together each year to explore ways to live out the Gospel in our families and our communities. A keynote speaker and a theme are chosen to help us ponder how we can make holy our chosen roles as parents, teachers, students, community volunteers, business owners and employees. We delve into study and discussion of deep theology presented by outstanding theologians from near and far. We are inspired by ideas presented in a variety of classes. We have fun enjoying recreation and conversation with other participants, new and old, throughout the days of the conference.

#### HISTORY OF SUMMER CONFERENCE

Summer Conference, originally known as the Mount Angel Summer Conference, was hosted by Mount Angel Abbey for its first 25 years. In 2007, after 25 years of vision and leadership, the founders of the Conference handed the reins to long-time Conference participants and staff who formed Engelberg Conference. In 2008, the non-profit organization reinitiated the Summer Conference in its new location at the University of Portland. The Conference continues to maintain ties to Mount Angel Abbey, and the Benedictine philosophy of integrating work and prayer permeates our activities at Summer Conference.

### SUMMER CONFERENCE GOALS

- Provide clergy, religious and lay people of all ages an opportunity to deepen their faith through study, prayer, art and play in a communal setting.
- Expose participants to outstanding theologians and inspiring people of faith.
- Model a Catholic faith-based community.
- Seek to understand the mystery of God and the mystery of person within the community of Catholic faith and the world.

#### GENERAL INFORMATION

The Conference begins on Wednesday with afternoon registration and concludes with a midday Mass on Sunday. The days are filled with a variety of study, prayer and play for all ages.

#### 2) DIALOGUE WITH KEYNOTER

An opportunity to explore specific topics presented during keynote through discussion in a small group setting.

#### 3) MONASTIC MUSINGS: 7 RICH WAYS OF LIVING THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

Br. Charles Gonzalez, OSB

For 1,500 years, the Rule of St. Benedict has recommended a balanced life of work and prayer that has built up a civilization of peace and communion in monasteries around the world. Certain practices, or "rich ways" of living, have sustained Benedictine monastic life and attracted others to practice them daily. We will examine the 7 Rich Ways of Prayer, Life Together, Deep Reading, Life Centered on the Eucharist, Hospitality, Promoting Arts and Culture, Caring for the Land and Environment and see how you might apply them to your family and everyday life.

#### 4) BE STILL AND KNOW THROUGH WRITING Jen Furl

Take some time to write and reflect on your Summer Conference insights and how they may guide you in navigating the joys and sorrows in your current life. Using the keynote address, excerpts from spiritual memoirs and poetry as inspiration, we will write and share together as a way to be still and know God's presence. Be sure to bring a journal and pen.

#### 5) CATHOLIC BIOETHICS IN THE MODERN WORLD

Nick Kockler

We will survey the major bioethical issues facing society today, such as reproductive health, end-of-life choices, and gene editing. We will reflect upon and discuss the intersection of scientific findings, Church teaching, and legal aspects to better understand how one may navigate these issues within the Catholic faith tradition.

#### 6) DISCERNING THE SPIRIT ON THE COMPLEX AND DIVISIVE ISSUE OF IMMIGRATION

Jay Conroy & Bruce Weber

In this class we will explore together the complex and divisive issue of immigration. Using the process of "Observe, Judge, Act," participants will reflect on the history of immigration in this country and in their own families, and briefly review the social teaching of the church on immigration. We will explore different perspectives on how our nation and our own communities should act toward those who migrate or seek to migrate, and we will discuss possible faith-based responses in our own daily walk.

#### 7) IGNITING THE SPIRITUAL IMAGINATION: PRAYING WITH THE SAINT JOHN'S BIBLE Beth Barsotti

Our time together will begin with an introduction to The St. John's Bible, an illuminated Bible commissioned by the Benedictine community at St. John's Abbey in Minnesota. It is the first illuminated, handwritten Bible in more than 500 years using traditional materials. The Bible is a feast for your eyes to behold! The illuminations will become part of our prayer as we engage in Visio Divina, a form of prayer where we slow down and both listen to and seek to see God's Word in Scripture and art. Come and be willing to be transformed by the graces we behold.


