KEYNOTE AND CONFERENCE THEME

Sr. Gertrude Feick's keynote invites us to share the fruit of her doctoral work through which we will come to know the life and spirituality of Cardinal Basil Hume. Basil Hume (1923-1999) was a Benedictine monk of Ampleforth Abbey in England. He served as Abbot for 13 years before being named the Cardinal Archbishop of Westminster, a position he held for the next 23 years. He was a superb leader and guide for his fellow monks and for countless people during his years as Abbot and Archbishop with a distinctive theological and spiritual vision. Sr. Gertrude's keynote will explore the core of Hume's vision—a deep, humble and sometimes playful

yearning for God shared in the hearts of men and women, which he called the 'pilgrim way'-something he shared with the Summer Conference community, then gathered at Mount Angel Abbey, in his 1997 keynote presentation "Towards a Civilization of Love." Sr. Gertrude will guide us to further explore this 'pilgrim way' and so deepen and enrich our own journeys toward God as Hume—the monk, pastor, and preacher—still speaks to contemporary Benedictines, the wider Church, and the world.

It is interesting to note that Sr. Gertrude's thesis moderator was another Summer Conference keynoter, Fr. Paul Murray, O.P. (1998: "Searching for God").

KEYNOTE SPEAKER: SR. GERTRUDE FEICK, O.S.B.

Sr. Gertrude Feick, O.S.B., is a Benedictine Sister of Queen of Angels Monastery in Mt. Angel, Oregon. She has earned four degrees in theology, the most recent a doctorate in Sacred Theology from the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas in Rome, Italy, with her dissertation entitled "A Pilgrim's Search for God: The Spirituality of Cardinal Basil Hume."

Earlier in her career Sr. Gertrude completed undergraduate and graduate studies in sports science and physical education and worked for a number of years in the field of health promotion. She has competed in national and international triathlons, explored the United

States, served in the U.S. Peace Corps in the Republic of South Africa, and has traveled extensively throughout the world. She landed in Mt, Angel, OR in 1999 while driving across the country with her tent and her bicycle. She entered Queen of Angels Monastery in 2000 and received the name of Gertrude, after St. Gertrude the Great of Helfta, a medieval mystic.

Sr. Gertrude has led numerous retreats at the sisters' retreat center, in parishes, and at Benedictine monasteries; she has taught at the undergraduate and graduate level at Mount Angel Seminary and the University of Portland on spirituality, liturgy, Scripture, and the Benedictine tradition. She currently has various liturgical responsibilities, leads retreats and presents on topics in Christian spirituality, organizes health care for her community, and volunteers at Providence Benedictine Nursing Center. She was chosen as a delegate to the 7th Benedictine-Shi'a Conference in Qum, Iran, in May, 2016. We are honored to welcome Sr. Gertrude as our keynoter.

WHAT IS SUMMER CONFERENCE?

For 34 years the Summer Conference has provided us with time for reflection and renewal. We come together each year to explore ways to live out the Gospel in our families and our communities. A keynote speaker and a theme are chosen to help us ponder how we can make holy our chosen roles as parents, teachers, students, community volunteers, business owners and employees. We delve into study and discussion of deep theology presented by outstanding theologians from near and far. We are inspired by ideas presented in a variety of classes. We have fun, enjoying recreation and conversation with other participants, new and old, throughout the days of the conference.

HISTORY OF SUMMER CONFERENCE

The Summer Conference, originally known as the Mount Angel Summer Conference, was hosted by Mount Angel Abbey for the first 25 years beginning in 1983. In 2007, after 25 years of

vision and leadership, the founders of the Conference handed the reins to long-time Conference participants who formed Engelberg Conference, a non-profit organization, and re-initiated the Summer Conference in its new location at the University of Portland in 2008. The Conference continues to maintain ties to Mount Angel Abbey, and the Benedictine philosophy of integrating work and prayer permeates our activities at Summer Conference.

- Provide clergy, religious and lay people of all ages an opportunity to deepen their faith through study, prayer, art and play in a communal setting.
- Expose participants to outstanding theologians and inspiring people of faith.
- Model a Catholic faith-based community.

2. JUBILEE OF MERCY

Archbishop John Vlazny and Fr. Charles Gordon, C.S.C. We will explore the theological and spiritual implications of Pope Francis' declaration that Mar. 15, 2015 thru Nov. 20, 2016 is a Year of Mercy. "This is the time of mercy. It is important that the lay faithful live it and bring it into different social environments. Go forth!" he said. This Year of Mercy/Jubilee of Mercy will be explored through presentations and discussions of the Pope's hopes for all of us and a review of divine mercy as written in the Gospel of Luke.

3. SPIRITUAL DIRECTION

Sr. Mary Jo Chaves, O.S.F.

Spiritual Direction is an opportunity to share your faith journey in a confidential setting with someone who is trained in the art of spiritual direction. Sr. Mary Jo will provide an overview of what spiritual direction is on the first day of class. On the other days of the class she will offer individual half hour sessions to participants.

4. ON CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME: JOURNEYING TOWARDS OUR FAITH

Pope Francis's encyclical, "Laudato Si': On Care for our Common Home," is a moral document, not a political document. Those who are firmly committed to their faith take it seriously. The encyclical has been misinterpreted by the secular media and others. Come and be guided as we journey to a deeper understanding.

5. DIALOGUE WITH KEYNOTER


